The late Richard P. Dixon is at the forefront of the DIY digital revolution, beautifully and inexpensively producing these two films, and then, here, presenting Unloosened and Root with live director's commentary. In both films Dixon uses a meta/hybrid approach, incorporating characteristics from Film's documentary and narrative forms, and Art's video, performance, painting and sculpture. In a 'real allegory,' Unloosened and Root (2006, 70 min) mourns the death of the Mother, where as, in the sequel, David Dixon is dead. (2009, 85 min), the Father attempts to rehabilitate meaning. Although, ostensibly about death, Dixon's work is anything but morose; rather, it is filled with colorful characters, unexpected moments and a genuine playfulness.
